CREATIVES IN SCHOOLS

On Friday 13 October, Weld St had an 'official' unveiling of our Creatives in Schools project. Our guest of honour was the artist for the programme: Kerala Heap and Michelle Crutchley was our photographer extraordinaire. We were thrilled to see so many parents attending and we were exceptionally proud of the way in which our students spoke about the timeline to creating their artworks with Kerala. They had to compete with a strong prevailing wind so for everyone who was unable to hear or attend the unveiling, here is what they said...

Our Creatives in Schools Timeline

When we first started working with Kerala we learnt what a symbol looked like. We tried to make some symbols out of coloured paper. Lena Kennedy-Good

Everybody had their own sketchbook. We used these nearly every lesson. We drew our ideas using pencil and this helped us plan our work. Harvey Mintrom

One day we walked to Fernhill Terrace to see the very first Wadestown School. It is a very old house and the lady who owns the house is 96 years old. Rose Nacey

We were very grateful to go into her garden and sit down and reflect on what it would have been like going to school there over 100 years ago. There weren't many houses in Wadestown at that time. Isla Mcdonald

When we came back to school we drew large maps of the Wadestown Streets that we walked down, using brown paper and charcoal. Finn Crutchley

We listened to the legend of Wellington Harbour and drew taniwhas. Eventually we painted taniwha pictures and Kerala taught us how to build up depth in our artwork. This means there were lots of things in the background. George Griffiths

One day we came into Room 2 and it smelt like the ocean. There were lots of different types of seaweed on the tables. We learnt how to look at the seaweed and try to sketch it without looking at the paper. This was called 'Blind Drawing' and it was quite tricky. Sadie Flynn

During our art lessons with Kerala we used lots of different materials like chalk pastels, oil pastels, paint, charcoal, ink, dye, crayon and pencil techniques. Ashton Maharaj

We used different types of paint brushes to create different effects. We experimented mixing paint to create different colours that would look good on our finished art pieces.

We learnt words like symbol, form, texture, depth, structure and tone. George Pilcher

During our art lessons with Kerala we used lots of different materials like chalk pastels, oil pastels, paint, charcoal, ink, dye, crayon and pencil techniques. Ashton Maharaj

Sometimes we pretended our classroom was an art gallery. Kerala taught us how to walk around the class and respectfully look at other people's artwork and make comments about it. Sometimes we were inspired by other people's ideas. Rita Churchouse

We learnt a lot about patterning and how to enlarge a small pattern onto a bigger piece of paper. These ideas became part of our finished art work. It felt unusual painting on a piece of wood because we had only ever used paper to do our work. Simi Bannister

"I am very proud of my finished piece of art and I get to see it every day at school."






Inter-Regional Cross Country

Congratulations to Isaac Thompson, Flo George, and Hugo Jones for their participation in the Inter-Regional Cross Country Championships in Christchurch! Here's a summary of their experiences and successes:

'In the last week of the last term, I travelled down to Christchurch for this year's Inter-Regional Cross Country. It was a great experience and very enjoyable. The course was very flat with the occasional small hill which personally I didn't enjoy because it was a very fast pace and that doesn't suit my race. 'The 2023 Inter-Regional Cross Country was held at Kakaha Park Selwyn,

in Canterbury, on the 21st of September. A team of approximately eighty Wellington runners flew down the day before the race. The course was a mix of flat grass, gravel hills and concrete pathways. The run was three kilometres for the Year 7 and 8 race. It had challenging hurdles, one of which was a horse jump that you could either run around or jump over. I was pleased with my result as I came 12th





overall and in the Team event, I came third. Overall, Wellington came first

against Canterbury, South Canterbury and Tasman. It was a great experience and I am extremely proud to have qualified.' - Flo George



When my parents and I went to Inter Regionals we got there pretty early so we could walk the track and have some time to get prepared for the race. I was very nervous before the race and wasn't too keen on doing it but my family all convinced me I'd be alright. We watched the races before mine and I saw some of my friends. I did warm-ups for 15-20 minutes to get my body warm and ready. Then I did stretches so I didn't get stiff muscles. The regions that were running were Wellington, Tasman and Canterbury. There were also three independent runners (I was one of them). When the starter went off lots of people sprinted and used all their energy. They soon fell

behind everyone. There was a part of the course with a horse jump that you could go over or around. I chose to go around because I think it saves time and energy. There was also a little zig-zag made out of hay that would slow you down. I went at a speed faster than my pace but slower than my sprint at the start. Then I paced the rest of the way and at the last bit, I sprinted. My final time was 7:33 for 2km. By Hugo Jones

YEAR 5 & 6 EPRO8 INTER-SCHOOL CHALLENGE

Last Thursday afternoon, 12 October, our two Year 5 and 6 EPro8 teams participated in the Inter-School Epro8 challenge at South Wellington Intermediate School. Our two Rimu school teams this year were; the Wadestown Wonders and Wadestown Wizards. I was in the Wizards team with Poppy, Kate and Jack and in the Wonders team was Ciaran, Emma, Will and Oliver.

When we first walked into the competition we were like "Wow! Look at all these electronics."

The first thing we did was find our station and look at the material. Ours was next to the other Wadestown team.

Next, the person who ran it told us some rules and showed us a few demonstrations of electronics and how to use the string cutter (which was surprisingly satisfying!). We had to make the tallest tower with a big gear and they would measure from the bottom to the big gear.

Neither of the Wadestown teams qualified to go through to the next stage, but we still got a certificate and we all really enjoyed the experience.
