Our Wadestown School Values

Our school values are "G-R-O-W":

Gratitude (Whakawhetai), Resilience (Manawaroa), Others (Whānaungatanga) and Wonder (Mīharo) Each term there are new opportunities to express these values.

Gratitude - is linked to overall happiness. Teachers will be encouraging students to regularly think about what they're thankful for because this will help to:

- evoke positive feelings and emotions
- remind us of all the things and people who contribute to our lives
- help build appreciation, empathy and kindness.

Gratitude is a social skill that students need to learn and practice.

Resilience – is a skill that can be taught. Our students will be given **challenges** along with opportunities to **problem-solve**. They will be encouraged to take **risks** and to see **"mistakes"**

as a learning opportunity. Learning how to manage their emotions will help them build their resilience.

Others – it is important that students learn skills to respect other people's personal space. There will be times when they need to cooperate with others and to share. They will learn to listen to others, to make eye contact and how to negotiate with others. During break times they will learn to play fair and to be a good sport.

Wonder - it is important for students to be able to critically think and reflect on the world around them. They will be encouraged to ask questions and to draw on their prior knowledge to assist with new learning. Our students will have the opportunity to engage with science and to think/wonder about how truly amazing their BRAINS are this term.

In this role I feel privileged to watch your child's school journey begin and progress through the school, developing a connection with you and your child. I love interacting in some small way with our students each day.

This year, I am also the Team Leader for Year 3 and 4 (Rata Team) so will be based at Rose St every Monday morning and all day Wednesday and Thursday. Away from school, I enjoy catching up with family and friends, an occasional movie, being engrossed in a book and a bike ride or walk. Whilst our three children are living in the UK and Europe,

my husband and I are enjoying travelling vicariously **with** them.

Curriculum Learning Areas

Literacy

At Wadestown School we are continuing our journey on **Structured Literacy** and this year one of our key focuses will be on **Handwriting**. Research has shown that the greatest impact on student writing is handwriting: **students being able to form letters correctly, and automatically**. This reduces the cognitive load for a student writing and it has been shown that handwriting has a greater impact on learning and memory.* In 2024 all Y1 - 8 classes will have handwriting lessons four times a week. Lessons will be explicit, systematic, cumulative and diagnostic. In Year 1 the focus will be on developing a correct pencil grip and learning to form letters correctly. In Year 2 the focus will also include neatness and automaticity.

Pohutukawa Team students have instructional reading and writing for one hour each day. This includes the teaching of: phonics, spelling, handwriting, oral language development and grammar.

Research has shown that the most important skills for success in reading and writing are:

- Being able to identify the first and last sound in a word
- Ability to segment sounds e.g the word is "can" and the sounds are c-a-n
- Ability to blend sounds together e.g. "r-a-t & the word is rat"

Mathematics

Students have daily lessons where there is a focus on developing number knowledge which involves: counting forwards and backwards, identifying numbers, learning about place value, and then being able to use this knowledge to solve word problems and equations in addition and subtraction. They are learning to **communicate** their solutions using pictures, words, and simple **equations**. Students work at various stages, according to their learning needs.

Statistics at the start of the year is a fun and authentic way for the children to learn about each other. They will take part in various 'surveys' to **gather data**, which the children learn to record as pictographs, tally charts and **bar graphs**.

Inquiry: Science and Health

This term our inquiry is about "Our AMAZING Brains". The primary focus learning areas will be science and health with the development of oral language within these learning areas.

Students will:

- recognise that all animals and humans have brains which help them to stay alive
- build their language and develop their understanding of what the brain does
- recognise that the brain helps us to learn about the world around us and to relate to others
- understand how to look after the brain e.g. the importance of sleep and wearing a helmet when scootering

On Wednesday 6 March, we have a trip booked to Wellington Zoo where students will participate in an "Animal Behaviour" workshop. Students will learn about the ways in which primate brains are unique, and they will find out about the strengths of different animals in terms of senses and cognition.

Physical Education

This term will have a focus on **athletics** (run - jump - throw) and tennis. On Wednesday afternoons classes will be cross-grouped and students will participate in a sports rotation programme. We are planning a Sports Day where parents can attend and stay for lunch. Further details to follow.

Te Ao Māori

Our Kapa Haka Kaiako (teacher) Hemi Prime teaches a weekly lesson on Thursdays. Alwyn Rees is also a specialist teacher in Te Reo and he teaches a fortnightly lesson on a Thursday covering Te Reo and the Aotearoa/New Histories curriculum. At the start of the term the learning will be focussed on Te Tiriti o Waitangi (The Treaty of Waitangi).

New students, teachers and whānau are all formally welcomed at the Mihi Whakatau at Rose St, in Week 3. This will begin at 9:15 am and is a wonderful opportunity to connect with the whole school.

The Arts

In the visual arts, students will develop their drawing and painting skills, using shape, form and colour to express themselves. Teachers will read books about art and artists and they will create a self-portrait in the style of an artist.

In music, students will also learn waiata (songs) together as a whole group.

Technology

Discovery Time on a Friday has a technology focus and our students learn to work with other students across the three classes at Weld Street. Often it is the students themselves who choose to work in a group. Teachers observe that some students prefer to still work by themselves to construct or complete a challenging task. We would like to have a variety of materials on offer and would appreciate parent contributions of loose parts or upcycled materials such as: craft supplies, buttons, straws, gems, ribbons and netting. Thank you to Michelle Crutchley for the recent delivery of quality fabric swatches .

Our Year 1 and 2 students will have group access to i-pads to support their literacy and numeracy learning.

Homework

- **Newstime:** It is expected that students will regularly participate and contribute during news time. This helps develop their oral language skills and helps students get to know one another.
- Reading **and** Poems: Students benefit from a daily time when they can read to their parents or a caregiver. This builds up their self-confidence and creates a 'reading mileage', which is so important for children learning to read. Poems on a Friday help students develop a sense of rhythm and rhyme, and **fun** with words. They are perfect for practicing reading with expression.

• Writing and Handwriting: Students need to have authentic writing opportunities, for example: writing their own birthday invitations or Easter cards for their family or friends.
